The clubs are working on their Distinguished Club Plan. Further awards will be achieved by the end of the year.

Area Governor Visits

This year I have re-visited all the clubs in my area and made an official visit to the City of Perth. My official visit to Perth JusTalk is scheduled for 5 April. I intend to visit AECOM and Central Communicators clubs in the coming week.

I love visiting clubs within my area. I always find that they are welcoming and their meeting are dynamic, fun and enjoyable as well as productive and educational.

Clubs Overview

Area C2 has four clubs. The City of Perth, Perth Just Talk and Central Communicators are community clubs while AECOM is a corporate club. Over the last three months I had the pleasure of working with the clubs and their club officers, who are dedicated and passionate about their clubs. The clubs have enjoyable atmosphere and strong educational focus (particularly evident in their mentoring programs).

The clubs have had some changes in their committees. I was particular concerned about Central Communicators in view of the fact that late last year they lost their Vice President Education who moved to eastern states. However, as I observed during my visits, this has been well managed by the club.

Retention of the existing members and attraction of new ones remains an issue for some clubs within the area. It is something that the clubs have recognised as an area for development and further improvement.

I also would like to highlight some changes in their meeting locations of the clubs. Central Communicators have moved from the Central Park to the David Malcolm Justice Centre on Barrack Street in March, which the City of Perth will be moving to their new location at the Holiday Inn Hay Street in the middle of May. On 1 May the club will say goodbye to their current venue (Comfort Inn Wentworth Plaza) where the club has been meeting for the past 20 years. The inn together with the Moon and Sixpence Pub will be bulldozed to make way for new development.

Membership

Six month ago I reported that the clubs have been experiencing fall in membership. This is still true for some clubs. Nevertheless, new members are joining. In this regard, I want to particularly highlight achievements of Central Communicators (leading the way within the area with 9 new members to date) and AECOM club with 6 new recruits.

AECOM is the smallest club within the area. It was severely impacted by the redundancies within the company. However, its committee worked hard to keep the club and attract new members.

I also would like to congratulate the City of Perth and Perth JusTalk with 3 and 4 new members respectively since 1 July 2016.

At the time of my official visit to the City of Perth I noticed 6 guests in attendance. I am confident that the number of new members at the club will increase before the end of the year.

I believe that the City of Perth, Perth JusTalk and Central Communicators will achieve President Distinguish status this year with at least 9 goals being met.

Club Officer Training

Central Communicators had four club officers trained and have also achieved this objective.

Contests

The City of Perth and Perth Just Talk held their contests on 27 February and 8 March respectively, while AECOM nominated a contestant for the international speech contest. Unfortunately, Central Communicators club did not have a participant.

The Area Contests were held on 11 March in CBD. In view of the requirements of various clubs that I was trying to accommodate, I chose to conduct the Area Contests on a Saturday afternoon. I must confess that I did find it a bit challenging to find volunteers to assist on Saturday. Nevertheless, I believe that overall the contests went well. I would like to again express my gratitude to everyone who assisted with the contests. Congratulations also to the winners of Area C2 International Speech and Evaluation contests.

Clubs Overview

Karratha - Karratha is the only Toastmasters club in the Pilbara region and the area has a strong community spirit that the club has benefited from greatly. However there has been a reduction of members due to people moving out of town and similar. The club now has to rely on a more active strategy of PR. Long time President Sally has resigned and Jacinta is now the president.

CPA – CPA is a strong club that runs vibrant and efficient breakfast meetings.

Rising Stars – While numbers have been low, they are now starting to make gains. There is a very dynamic atmosphere in this club. Coach Peta Rakela is an asset to the club.

Dynamic Speakers – There are some experienced members at this club, and there is an earnestness there, that just requires a few more members.

235 - This is KPMG's closed club, after a massive hiatus, they have just avoided oblivion and have started meeting again which is a testament to president Steve McCabe!

Membership

Karratha – for a while meeting attendance was down to as low as 5. Now often topping the 10 mark, has managed to recruit a few more members.

CPA - Great numbers, around Charter strength at all the meetings I've visited. Very committed membership base considering the time slot and the fact members come from many locations. Very good retention.

Rising Stars - Struggling with numbers, have lost some members. Luckily, have Peta as club Coach. Club has run initiatives such as a demo meeting. Looks like numbers are on the rise.

Dynamic Speakers - Struggling with numbers, have lost some experienced and inexperienced members. In need of a club coach. Have suggested new membership drives with their leadership.

235 - Numbers appear good on paper with renewals, have yet to visit a meeting.

DCP Goals

Mixed results, some clubs definitely, others may fall short or may not have completed Success Plan. Main issue is membership levels & retention for the struggling clubs.

Club Officer Training

Karratha – COT Goal Achieved. Dynamic Speakers – COT Goal Achieved. Rising Stars – COT Goal Achieved. 235 – No officers trained.

CPA – COT Goal achieved in second round, one short on first round.

Contests

Karratha held contests and have had the coup of representing C3 in both the International and Evaluation Contests. Lizeth is continuing on to represent Central Div in the International contest. CPA held strongly contested competitions over 2 different breakfast meetings.

Rising Stars managed to hold an exciting competition during lunch hour.

Dynamic Speakers nominated competitors to the Area Final. 235 not involved in Area Contest.

Success Stories

CPA continues to be a very strong club with great retention. 235 managed to restart even when it seemed like it was not continuing. Karratha, Rising Stars and Dynamic Speakers have a strong core of members who with their perseverance I'm sure will see a further strengthening of these clubs.

Persuasive Speakers is a prospective club that meets twice a month in the City on a Wednesday and has managed to attract a very vibrant crowd, the members of whom are young or young at heart. A lot of the membership is in software development or entrepreneurship. With some further strong membership drives this club will charter. The members are already becoming self-reliant as most of the new members have learnt how to do the various club meeting roles.

Risky Toastmasters club – two casual visits have been performed. Formal visit for second Area Director Report was held on Wednesday 22 March 2017 and report has been submitted.

Meeting Procedures – yet to attend a club meeting either casually or formally.

Clubs Overview

Curtin GSB – this club has a constant stream of guests which often become members. The club has a great group of club officers who are enthusiastic about improving the club. The club is very well engaged in Area activities. Overall there are no issues with this club, good membership base, good club officer group. This is a fun and social, yet professional and efficient club to be involved with.

Curtin Sundowners – a social group of dedicated members who enjoy going for a drink and pizza after the meetings. Good group of club officers. Strong mentorship within the club and hugely welcoming to new members and guests. The club is well engaged in Area activities. Membership and meeting attendance has recently seen a bit of a dip and some activities could be done to pick up attendance and engagement. Action to be determined following second Area Director visit.

Risky Toast – due to work-related pressures and deadlines which Risky Toast members are often facing, attendance at meetings can sometimes be less than what would be preferred. However, the club has a great President and Vice President Education who are dedicated to keeping the club going and have recently done a membership drive within their workplace which resulted in an increase in guests. No interest in being involved with Area activities. Being a work-based group (membership paid for by BWA), many members prioritise work over attending meetings and doing speeches. Overall, this club has a lot of potential and are likely to meet Select Distinguished status.

Meeting Procedures – club has recently been invigorated by District leadership group after Bechtel club conceded. Have previously been self-sufficient and do not get involved in Area events, contests, or anything outside of the regular club meeting, however the new Meeting Procedures may be more engaged in future, with membership now being open to the community.

Membership

Curtin GSB – currently has 24 members up from a base of 20.

Curtin Sundowners – currently has 16 members up from a base of 25.

Risky – currently have 20 members from a base of 16 members.

Meeting Procedures – currently have 8 members from a base of 22 members.

DCP Goals

Clubs Overview

Shell Toastmasters for a while were thinking of closing down due to lack to numbers, but on the last day decided to keep it going for another six months. Her reason for low numbers is due to Shell moving from construction to operation phase. After its initial struggle last October, Jacobs is going strong thanks to Robyn's help, even though they still have low membership numbers. Durack is the strongest club in my area followed by Terrace Club. Terrace Speakers has struggled to grown in number since its inception in October last year.

Membership

Membership is at bare minimum at Terrace Speakers, Jacobs and Shell Toastmaster clubs. Both the corporate clubs have struggled for numbers all year. Durack and Terrace are holding their own with strong membership numbers.

DCP Goals

All the clubs in my area are struggling to meet their educational goals they set for themselves at the beginning of the year. Clubs Overview

Victoria Park has been strong club with a dedicated committee. The club is attracting many guests and successfully converting them to guests too. There has been a drop in membership number as a number of senior members left the club for their personal reasons. However, I am confident that the club committee will continue to maintain the meeting quality high.

Western Founder has been maintaining its good health for over 2 years with minimum non-renewals (1 or 2) each membership renewal terms. The club has been maintaining about 20 members steadily since 2015. Although the membership size is not big, apology/no-show rate is very low that their meetings fill up with about 20 members most of the times.

Belmont has gone through some loss in membership and a committee member. Marlene Ong, former club president, has resigned from her role in February 2017 due to the changes in her employment. Although the club meetings enjoyed vibrant atmosphere, absence of President for two months, February and March, has impacted on the club's administration including April's membership renewals. In April, Charles Fisher has been appointed to fill in for the role of President for the remainder of 2016-2017. Having a good number of senior TM members at the club including Vicky Post, Charles Fisher and Jon Teh, I am confident that the club will adjust itself shortly.

DTM Pathway has made through the year with several challenges since 2016-2017 TM year commenced. At the start of the year, membership dropped from 20 to 10. The club actively invited the guest speakers to make the meeting more vibrant. I am pleased to state that the members made effort to make every single meeting time well-spent and interesting. However, the membership number stay the same at 10 without adding new members until now. Although the time has been challenging, I feel that all current members of DTM Pathway are dedicated to revitalise the club again with new education pathway.

Contest representatives from E13 Area Finals are: Martin Lindsay (Guildford Stars) for Evaluation Contest & Martin Lindsay (Ellenbrook) for the International Speech Contest. Judith Allen has been contacting schools in the City of Swan around the community school program 'Youth Out Loud'.

Area E14 – 08th April 2017 Eastern Division – District 17

Our Area E14 is made up of four clubs with three being based in Kalgoorlie (WA School of Mines {WASM} = meets weekly, Golden Gourmet dinner club meets monthly and the original club Touch of Gold = meets fortnightly) and one advanced club in Perth called Leading Lights = meets monthly. All the E14 clubs have evening meetings.

Educational Awards

The clubs have great aspirations for the year and anticipate that their members' awards (and those of the club) will begin achieving milestones in the second half of the year. Discussion with the VPEs to monitor member progress has been carried out in person and/or by email on multiple occasions and a reminder on ensuring members close to completion of their manuals get the maximum opportunity to do so. Members and the VPE were also reminded to complete CL manuals.

WASM has 1 CL and 5 DCP points.

Golden Gourmet has 2CC, 1ACS, 1CL and 6 DCP points.

Touch of Gold has 1ACB, 1CL and 6 DCP points.

Leading Lights has 2CC, 1 ACB and 4 DCP points.

Area Director Visits

Since January, I have visited WASM Club 5 times; Golden Gourmet Club 3 times; Touch of Gold 3 times; and Leading Lights 1 time (as WAG). I have completed all of my Area Director Club Visits and have filed all of my Area Director Visit Reports on the TI website.

Clubs Overview

The Clubs in my Area display both strengths and challenges that I am sure are common to all clubs. All club members are passionate and positive on what they think of the club and what they get out of participating at meetings. Membership numbers are not large in any club which can present challenges in having enough volunteers for each meeting and this puts ongoing pressure on VPEs and Toastmasters to convene meetings and fill roles. Shared events get good attendance across all clubs to make them very effective. There is a lot of pressure on maintaining 3 clubs in Kalgoorlie.

Membership

Membership numbers hovered between 11 and 15 for all clubs, having significant lack of renewal in March. There is a bimodal population in membership with those who are longer standing and the typical membership of only one year duration. **WASM** has 12 members (**Target** 19 Members) and the average life of a WASM member is 0.5 years (reflecting membership for only the current academic year). **Touch of Gold** has 12 members (**Target** 20 Members) and the average life of a ToG member is 5.7 years (reflecting experienced members – but very few new members). **Golden Gourmet** has 12 members (**Target** 18 Members) and the average life of a GG member is 4.8 years (also reflecting its experienced membership with some new members). **Leading Lights** has 12 members (**Target** 19 Members) and the average life of a LL member is 10.6 years (reflecting its experienced membership).

Feedback from club members and Club Officers is that the on-line choice of annual memberships would reduce workload, increase membership and remove tension between club officers and members at renewal periods. The online renewal system does not work, because currently, March 2017 renewals do not allow renewing for the period of October 2017 to March 2018. Members are unhappy about having to renew the second 6-month period after April 1st after all of the hassle of a March renewal.

DCP Goals

The clubs have intentions to meet their DCP goals, but are challenged on facilitating these through closing off attainment of education awards before shorter term members withdraw from the club. A large reason for this is club member turnover due to work commitments (ToG) or end of school term (WASM). Maintenance of CL manuals appears to be an ongoing challenge. All four clubs have already met 2 DCP goals.

WASM has 5 DCP Points.
Golden Gourmet has 6 DCP points.
Touch of Gold has 6 DCP points.
Leading Lights has 4 DCP points.

Club Officer Training

All Area E14 clubs had 6 attendees doing COT, except for WASM which had 4 attendees. (**LL:**6, **GG**:6,**ToG**:6, **WASM**:4). We ensure good attendance at the Kalgoorlie COT session by organising the training as part of a larger group event, including Area Council meeting, Area Contest and a social function.

Contests

All Area E14 clubs conducted club contests in February and competed in the Area contest hosted by Golden Gourmet also in February. The clubs were well represented at the Eastern Division contest final in March, and we have a representative in the ISC at D17 Convention in May 2017.

Success Stories

Leading Lights has rebranded and energised the WA Governors club.

We have a DTM candidate (IH) in the Touch of Gold club and WASM is working towards its 100th meeting milestone – both targeted before June 30th 2017.

Strengths / Challenges

WASM has a more streamlined meeting this semester which has been reduced to 90 minutes.

Touch of Gold moved its club meeting venue late last year to the Stage Left Theatre venue to provide a performance stage to practice on. This turned out to be an unsuccessful. Touch of Gold will be moving to a new venue, the City managed CY O'Connor Community Hall, located behind the City Library. This required changing from the 1st & 3rd Wednesday of the month to the 2nd & 4th Wednesday of the month. The first meeting at the new venue was held on Wednesday 12th April. It was a great success and we achieved 3 new members on the night.

Golden Gourmet has decided to move their meeting to the first Thursday of the month to be during an alternate week to Touch of Gold.

Future Planning

We have been examining the options for carrying out a Speechcraft course in the second half of 2017.

WASM Toastmasters have assisted Mina Cho with the development of Curtin Toastmasters Club at Bentley in Area E12, and are Club Sponsors. Both I and Sam Spearing (the other WASM Sponsor) have attended meetings at Curtin Toastmasters to give further support to Mina's new club.

Touch of Gold and Golden Gourmet have been assisting a group in Esperance to lay the foundations for a new community club known as Toastmasters Esperance.

Educational Awards

- Noranda has achieved one CC award and expects to achieve another CC and one CL before the term ends.
- Highgate has not achieved any awards. The club's experienced members lodge their awards through their other Toastmasters clubs which are in better positions to achieve DCP club award statuses.

Area Director Visits

- Noranda Since the last report, I unofficially attended another meeting, the last Area Finals held at

Experienced members are very supportive of newer members but appear to run and take on a lot of roles in meeting to accommodate for the full agenda and lack of membership numbers. Newer members do not always respond to VPE in sufficient time to organise agenda and seem to expect to pick up roles on the night. Do not want to discourage newer members although this makes the VPE's role challenging.
- Noranda very close group of people. Club feels like a closely connected community. Members know each other very well and appear to love and appreciate their club. It feels good to be there. Members want to make their meetings interesting, fun and to create an encouraging learning environment. One weakness which is also a strength is their reliance on two experienced Toastmasters who are respected and appear to almost coach the club when needed. Very strong, productive and hard working Committee that achieves results.
- Maylands very vibrant and energetic club. Lots of members with a mix of experienced and newer members. Members want to learn, develop and take-on more roles and opportunities. The club has many opportunities to socialise and mix with other members before, during and after meetings.
- **Highgate** Attendance numbers can vary. Members are welcoming and have an allocated time during meeting for supper and socialising. Would benefit from having more members.

Membership

- Banyandah currently has 11 members. Membership campaign being undertaken by the club
 President including letterbox dropping of Toastmasters magazines and advertising at the nearby
 university. Club VPPR has started adding pictures and promotional items to the clubs Facebook
 page.
- Highgate only has 6 members who renewed/joined since the last renewal period. I have joined to
 increase membership and support the club and will continue to attend every meeting. The club has
 exhausted potential membership lists and are still looking at other ways of marketing and
 attracting new members (e.g. creating or developing their Facebook pages, trialling 'Meet-up'

Clubs Overview

Gateway & Victoria Quay continue to be vibrant Community clubs. Meetings are well organised and well run, attended by a mix of experienced & newer Members . Individual & Club goals are being met in a friendly, supportive atmosphere.

Gourmet is an Advanced Club focusing on advanced manual speeches with group evaluations to give pointed feedback. The challenge for Gourmet is to recruit new members.

City of Cockburn is struggling with Membership & general despondency. The current Committee is suffering from fatigue and the majority have indicated they don't wish to continue in their roles. Because of the small membership base there is not much option to recruit other Members.

Membership

Victoria Quay have 39/45 Members renew which was surprising given that more attrition was expected due to some Members moving to the new Club "Fremantle QuayNote" being sponsored by Victoria Quay. Gateway had 25 Members renew. Of the 11 members that didn't re-join 4 definitely won't, 7 uncertain. Gourmet has 15 enthusiastic Members but is still chasing those remaining elusive 5 members to reach charter strength.

City of Cockburn has a net membership of 9. Three new Members have joined but this has been offset by Members that have left. The Club continues to struggle with Club numbers which has a flow on effect influencing meeting vibrancy.

DCP Goals

Victoria Quay has already achieved PD (10/10 goals). Gateway are also PD. They currently have 9/10 goals & will likely obtain one more AC award to obtain all 10 goals by the end of the year. Gourmet currently have 8/10 goals but are challenged on membership goals/charter strength. City of Cockburn (currently 3/10 goals) is still in serious trouble and unless many new members are recruited I don't expect will meet DCP goals.

Club Officer Training

Overall 18 Club Officers attended the 2^{nd} round of COT. Victoria Quay had 6 Officers attend, Gateway had 5, City of Cockburn had 4 & disappointingly Gourmet only had 3 attend.

Contests

Individual Club & Area Competitions complete. Gateway held both international & Evaluation Speech Competitions. Victoria Quay held Competitions over 2 meetings. Fremantle Gourmet nominated 2 Contestants for the Area final. City of Cockburn nominated a Contestant for the Speech Evaluation Competition but they did not end up participating.

Gateway hosted the Area Final, which went off well.

Fremantle Gourmet have moved to a new location at the Swan Yacht Club. The new venue is more conducive to holding Toastmaster meetings & will hopefully attract new Members. City of Cockburn held a Demonstration Meeting on the 30th March with 9 Visitors attending. A good impression was created with a few Visitors indicating they would be returning.

Fremantle QuayNote Toastmasters was aiming to charter in April 2017. Need to follow up if this has happened yet.
