
Membership Building and Retention

Current Membership Status

Paid Clubs





District 17 Public Relations Manager Report

Communication Plan

A decision was made at the previous District Management meeting to approve the use of tiqbiz as a communications medium. The district hierarchy has been sent up as communication groups and administrators and editors can be set up for each group. Links to the district website and convention website set up. Clubs can also have their websites linked directly on request. Using the calendar is very easy and allows multiple reminders to be set to multiple groups of people. PDF documents such as agendas and can be attached and opened in the app. The annual cost is \$450 ex GST.

Public Relations PPP and Social Media

Clubs are still very slow to submit entries but things have picked up a bit after the last Club officer training sessions. Many clubs are active on Meetup, Facebook and have open house events and anniversaries. A special Facebook page for VPPRs have been created based on feedback from the last COT session.

At the request of VPPRs we set up and ran a FreeToastHost workshop at very short notice. Approximately 25 attendees turned up and are hopefully now using their websites to promote their club and to integrate with Facebook.

Word-of-mouth in the modern era is telling everyone on Facebook and other social media. Not just share photo but include a call to action.

Awards Night 2015-2016

The date for the awards night has been confirmed as 7 July 2017. Help will be appreciated.

Website Audits

All the clubs were contacted to update their details on the revamped District website and this is now completed. There are some clubs without VPPR roles filled according to the latest club officer list.

Speakers Bureau

The Speakers Bureau is now running monthly auditions and have so far approved 2 speakers. The website is still under development and once it is ready will link to the district website.

Overseas Visitors

Darren LaCroix visited in February and presented at two of the COT sessions. He also ran two workshops, one at Bentley and another at the state library. This was very well received by the participants.

Other

Promotion of the District convention is continuing.

Generic business cards that can be used by clubs in the place of flyers has progressed.

An event for the 1st weekend of June is being investigated.

A provisional booking has been made for a Toastmaster social retreat weekend away on 28/29 April. This is not an official district event, but an opportunity to relax, discuss membership and explore using Social media.

Central Division - April 2017

Educational Awards

As of 2 April 2017

- 20 Competent Communicator awards have been submitted. This is the same number of awards submitted as in January.
- Six Competent Leader awards have been submitted. There had been five such awards submitted in January.

I will continue to encourage the Central team ask their clubs to submit any further educational awards earned.

Membership

As of 3 April 2017, 18 of the 20 Central clubs met or exceeded the minimum number of eight active members. Two clubs, Speakers Bureau and Meeting Procedures, have members registered, but are below eight members. We will work together to get those two clubs' memberships to minimum strength, and the division will continue to maintain a focus across the board on membership.

- There are seven clubs with 20 or more members. Central Communicators, CPA, Curtin GSB, Plain Speakers, 235 Toastmasters, City of Perth and Risky Toast. This is up from four clubs in this position in March.
- Nine of the 20 clubs have 14 members, or less. In January there were 12 clubs with less than 14 members, which is an encouraging trend. In March, there were still nine clubs in this position
- Six clubs have made a net gain of between one and four members this Toastmasters year. Risky, CPA, AECOM, Curtin GSB, Central Communicators, and Plain Speakers. In January, only four clubs had net membership gains.
- The other remaining 13 clubs have lost from one to 14 members. This was 16 clubs in January, again a mild positive trend

DCP Goals

As of 2 April 2017

- Four clubs have five or six DCP points: Curtin GSB Sundowners, Plain Speakers, City of Perth and Dynamic Speakers. Plain Speakers and City of Perth are above 20 members.
- Three clubs are on four DCP points: Central Communicators, Curtin GSB and Risky Toast. They all have over 20 members.
- Six clubs have three DCP points CPA, Rising Stars, Karratha, West End, Perth Justalk, and Speakers Bureau.
- Three clubs have two DCP points
- Four clubs have one DCP point
- No club has zero DCP points

Club Officer Training

Central held club officer training on February 9 at the Innovation Centre in Bentley. In addition, Jon Teh visited Karratha to deliver training to that club, and I delivered training to two officers from BankWest. While I would like to have seen all club officers attend Club Officer Training, 13 of the 20 Central clubs had four or more officers trained in the latest round of training – some 62 officers. Six officers were trained of the remaining seven Central Division clubs.

Contact with Area Directors

The Central Division team has been keeping in touch through emails and phone calls, as well as a division council meeting in February. This was a mixed physical and Skype based meeting, which worked well, except for one participant who unfortunately was unable to connect. Area directors have also been seeing each other at pop-up Toastmaster meetings run by Robyn Lloyd around the CBD, and at meetings of the Stanley College club.

I will be aiming to lift the frequency of communications in the run-up to the end of the Toastmasters year.

Contests

All Central area and division International Speech and Evaluation contests have been successfully held.

- C1 contests were held on March 23, at Northbridge Toastmasters
- C2 on March 11, at 43 Below in Perth
- C3 on March 12, at the Tom Dadour Centre in Subiaco
- C4 on 17 March, at Curtin GSB in Perth
- C5 on March 15, at the Grosvenor building in Perth

The Central Division contests were held on April 1, at the Shenton Park Community Centre. Janette Edwards won the International contest, and Lizeth de La Hoz Ruiz was the second place getter. In the Evaluation contest, Jennifer van den Hoek was the winner, and Garry Goh second place getter. All four will represent Central Division in their respective District 17 convention contests, in May of this year.

Clubs

In the last two months, I have visited meetings of the following clubs: Northbridge, AECOM, Electric Toasters, Dynamic speakers, and NAB Toastmasters. In addition, I have attended the club contests of Rising Stars, and Curtin GSB Sundowners. Several of these clubs have been going through difficult times with lower membership numbers than they would have liked. It is encouraging to see signs of increasing membership, and I would be delighted to see this trend continue.

New Clubs

There are several new clubs in the Central Division

- A demo meeting was held at Stanley College in Northbridge on February 6, and meetings have been held since.
- Persuasive Speakers club is still yet to achieve 20 members. There were many enthusiastic visitors present when I visited in January of this year. I plan to visit again when I can, to check progress, and see what additional help can be provided to get this club to charter.
- A demonstration meeting was held on March 7 for BHP Billiton, and this club is in the throes of chartering.
- A meeting of the Meeting Procedures club committee was held on March 16.

Successors for Director Roles

As well as keeping my eyes open for successors, I have asked the rest of the Central team to do the same. I have been in contact with Mark Richards of the nominations committee, and put forward some names for him to contact as possible Area Directors for next Toastmasters year.

Other Information/Comments

I attempted to use the visit of World Champion public speaker Darren LaCroix earlier in the year, to try and get some publicity for district 17 by trying to secure a radio interview for him. I made contact with two radio stations, but was unable to secure an interview. I was told the impending state election was dominating available time, and it was difficult to devote air time to other topics.

I also wrote an article on Darren and submitted it to both the Community News and Perth Voice newspapers, but was unsuccessful in having the story published.

Educational Awards

Forty-nine educational awards have been lodged: 32 communication awards and 17 leadership awards. Two clubs have no awards lodged.

Membership

One hundred new memberships have been lodged during this Toastmaster year, 59 of these since the September report. The highest membership growth has been in the Victoria Park, Kalamunda and WASM. No new members have been signed on in Terrace or DTM Pathways.

Minimal renewal requirement was met by 17 of the 18 clubs, but membership retention will not be clear until renewals are completed this month.

At present membership sits at 315. Base membership at July 1 was 339 – about 9% drop.

DCP Goals

Nine of the 18 clubs have achieved at least 5 DCP goals, with Victoria Park on 9 goals and Ellenbrook and Mundaring on 7. Six of those clubs have the membership requirement for DCP recognition. Two further clubs are likely to achieve Distinguished status or higher.

Club Officer Training

Both rounds of Club Officer training were generally well attended. Three clubs - Terrace, Shell and Belmont, failed to have at least four members attend the second round.

Contact with Area Directors

Regular contact is made by email with all Area Directors particularly with regard to their Area Contests. I was pleased with the regular updates provided prior to each contest.

An online meeting was held on 5th February 2017 to discuss TLI/COT, Area and Division Contests, new clubs and succession plans. These skype meetings are working well. Communication to finalise Eastern Division Contest arrangements were very effective.

All Area Directors are diligent in responding to emails and in including me in correspondence regarding their area activities and concerns.

Contests

All Area Contests have been held and notification of the winners were forwarded to me for the Division Contest. Area Directors were responsible for organizing their contests and these were run according to the contest rulebook requirements. The E11 Area Speech Evaluation Contest was held with one contestant.

The Eastern Division Contest, held on 18 March 2017 went very well, with the cooperation and support of Area Directors and Belmont Club officers who helped with venue organization. It was very well attended by at least 60 (the maximum accommodation for this venue).

Clubs

As well as the clubs whose membership numbers still remain below required 20 or growth of 5 clubs, there are three clubs which are a cause for concern.

The future of corporate club Shell in E11 is at risk due to restructuring and the imminent loss of one of its proactive members. Of the 21 members registered, less than 8 renewed and there was report of little interest from those remaining. No committee members attended COT and no DCP awards have been lodged.

Terrace Club in E11 has a drop in membership, and no new members registered. Only 2 DCP awards have been registered and only 2 members attended COT.

Belmont Club in E14 has also suffered a loss of membership and have no awards registered. Only 2 members attended COT.

DTM Pathways in E14 has had no new members this year.

New Clubs

Curtin Toastmasters Bentley is progressing very well, following two successful demonstration meetings at Curtin University in January run by Area E14 Director Mina Cho. Meetings are held fortnightly and are well attended. With active support by Curtin management and steady growth of membership, it is hoped that Curtin will charter before the end of June.

The Esperance Toastmasters demonstration meeting was held on Tuesday 14 March, and was attended by three Toastmasters from Kalgoorlie and by District Director Leonor Ragan, in support of Marilyn Southern from Esperance. Those who attended were interested, but in order to be successful, at least 17 members need to be signed on if the club is to be viable. Attendance by support Toastmasters from Kalgoorlie will be minimal. At this stage, it seems unlikely that an Esperance Toastmasters Club will be possible.

Successors for Director Roles

Two recommendations were made to Nominating Chairman Mark Richards.

Other Information/Comments

Each of the four Area Directors has continued to work towards the success of their area. Official club visits are underway or planned for in the next few weeks. I have found them all very open in their communication and professional in the execution of their Area Director duties. They are a pleasure to work with.

Retention of the existing members and attraction of new ones remains an issue for some clubs within the area. It is something that the clubs have recognised as an area for development and further improvement.

I also would like to highlight some changes in their meeting locations of the clubs. Central Communicators have moved from the Central Park to the David Malcolm Justice Centre on Barrack Street in March, which the City of Perth will be moving to their new location at the Holiday Inn Hay Street in the middle of May. On 1 May the club will say goodbye to their current venue (Comfort Inn Wentworth Plaza) where the club has been meeting for the past 20 years. The inn together with the Moon and Sixpence Pub will be bulldozed to make way for new development.

Membership

Six month ago I reported that the clubs have been experiencing fall in membership. This is still true for some clubs. Nevertheless, new members are joining. In this regard, I want to particularly highlight achievements of Central Communicators (leading the way within the area with 9 new members to date) and AECOM club with 6 new recruits.

AECOM is the smallest club within the area. It was severely impacted by the redundancies within the company. However, its committee worked hard to keep the club and attract new members.

Shell Toastmasters for a while were thinking of closing down due to lack to numbers, but on the last day decided to keep it going for another six months. They only have six paid members so far and I have been in contact with Jacqui (club President) to see how they could revive the club. Her reason for low numbers is due to Shell moving from construction to operation phase. After its initial struggle last October, Jacobs is going strong thanks to Robyn's help, even though they still have low membership numbers. Durack is the strongest club in my area followed by Terrace Club. Terrace Speakers has struggled to grown in number since its inception in October last year.

Membership

Membership is at bare minimum at Terrace Speakers, Jacobs and Shell Toastmaster clubs. Both the corporate clubs have struggled for numbers all year. Durack and Terrace are holding their own with strong membership numbers.

DCP Goals

All the clubs in my area are struggling to meet their educational goals they set for themselves at the beginning of the year. Durack club and Terrace Speakers have achieved 5 goals each and are looking to achieve select distinguished or higher. Terrace Club and Jacobs have achieved 2 goals so far. I will be discussing with clubs what their revised goals are during my official Area Director's visit. Shell has achieved 1 goal so far, Shell is looking to survive and not looking at achieving DCP goals.

- Two clubs prepared Club Success Plans (CSP). Both have made a considerable amount of progress towards achieving the goals and KPIs listed.
- For the other two remaining clubs, preparing a CSP is not their first priority. The reason for this is
 that membership numbers are low, with an unbalanced mix of only two-three/four experienced
 Toastmasters at each club picking up most leadership/evaluation roles. The remaining members
 from these two cubs are fairly new and inexperienced and are at the early stages of completing
 both manuals.
- Maylands has achieved one CC and one Advanced Communicator award and is expecting to
 achieve another CC and one CL award. The club's members are highly motivated and have been
 steadily progressing through both manuals. Club meetings/agendas are well organised. With a large
 membership base, members cannot get on the agenda to make project speeches as often as
 smaller clubs.
- **Banyandah** has achieved three educational awards and gained two DCP points in these categories. The club will potentially achieve two more educational awards by 30-06-17.
- **Noranda** has achieved one CC award and expects to achieve another CC and one CL before the term ends.
- Highgate has not achieved any awards. The club's experienced members lodge their awards through their other Toastmasters clubs which are in better positions to achieve DCP club award statuses.

- Noranda Since the last report, I unofficially attended another meeting, the last Area Finals held at

- Noranda very close group of people. Club feels like a closely connected community. Members know each other very well and appear to love and appreciate their club. It feels good to be there. Members want to make their meetings interesting, fun and to create an encouraging learning environment. One weakness which is also a strength is their reliance on two experienced Toastmasters who are respected and appear to almost coach the club when needed. Very strong, productive and hard working Committee that achieves results.
- Maylands very vibrant and energetic club. Lots of members with a mix of experienced and newer members. Members want to learn, develop and take-on more roles and opportunities. The club has many opportunities to socialise and mix with other members before, during and after meetings.
- **Highgate** Attendance numbers can vary. Members are welcoming and have an allocated time during meeting for supper and socialising. Would benefit from having more members.

Membership

- Banyandah currently has 11 members. Membership campaign being undertaken by the club
 President including letterbox dropping of Toastmasters magazines and advertising at the nearby
 university. Club VPPR has started adding pictures and promotional items to the clubs Facebook
 page.
- Highgate only has 6 members who renewed/joined since the last renewal period. I have joined to
 increase membership and support the club and will continue to attend every meeting. The club has
 exhausted potential membership lists and are still looking at other ways of marketing and
